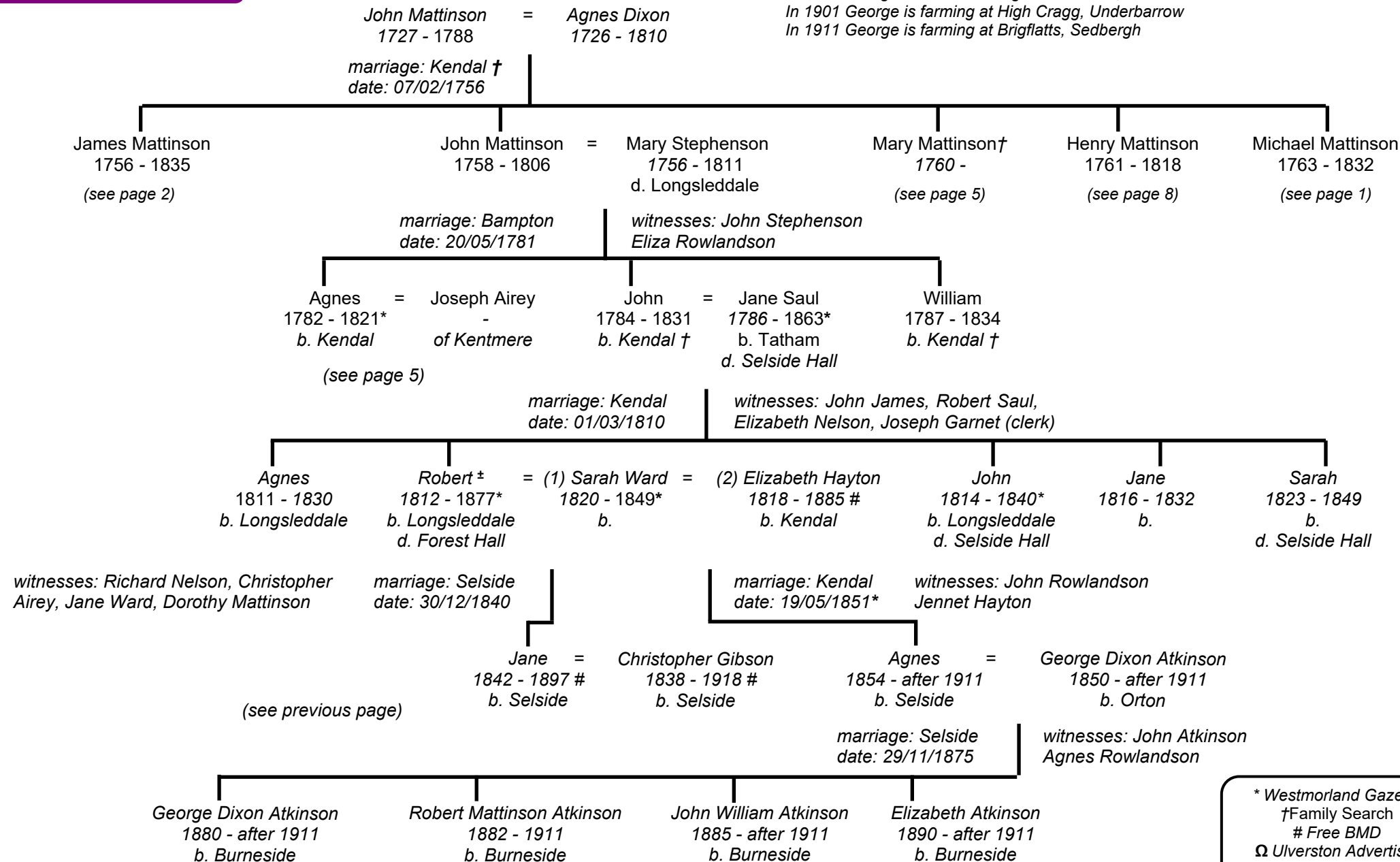
Robert was farming at **Selside Hall** in 1840 and when married in 1851. Later in the century Selside Hall was farmed by Thomas Airey. After that in 1901, Anthony Atkinson was the farmer. His first wife was a granddaughter of Agnes Ellwood and his second wife a granddaughter of John and Mary Martindale who had farmed Selside Hall from the beginning of the century, and then Isaac Walker Martindale.  
In 1881 Christopher Gibson is farming at Cooper House, Selside  
In 1891 Christopher is farming at Weston on Trent, Derbyshire  
In 1901 & 1911 the widowed Christopher is farming at Old Hall Farm, Mayfield, Derbyshire

In 1911 George is farming at Brigflatts, Sedbergh

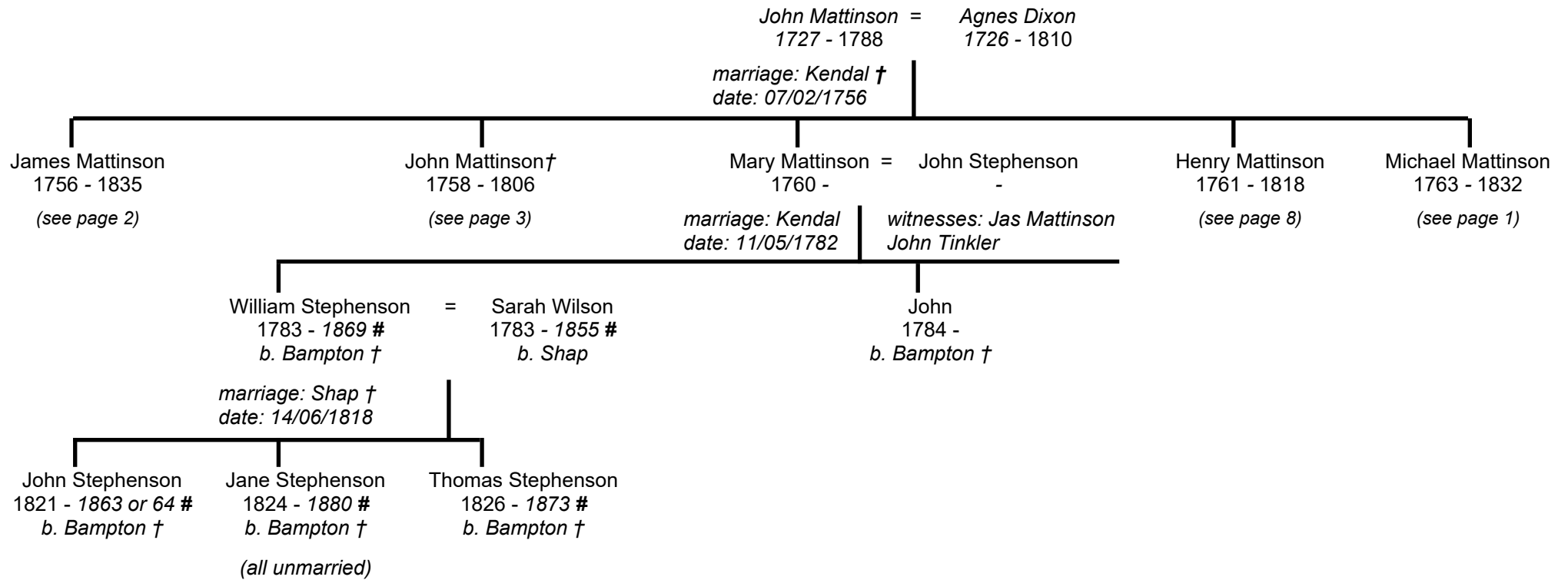

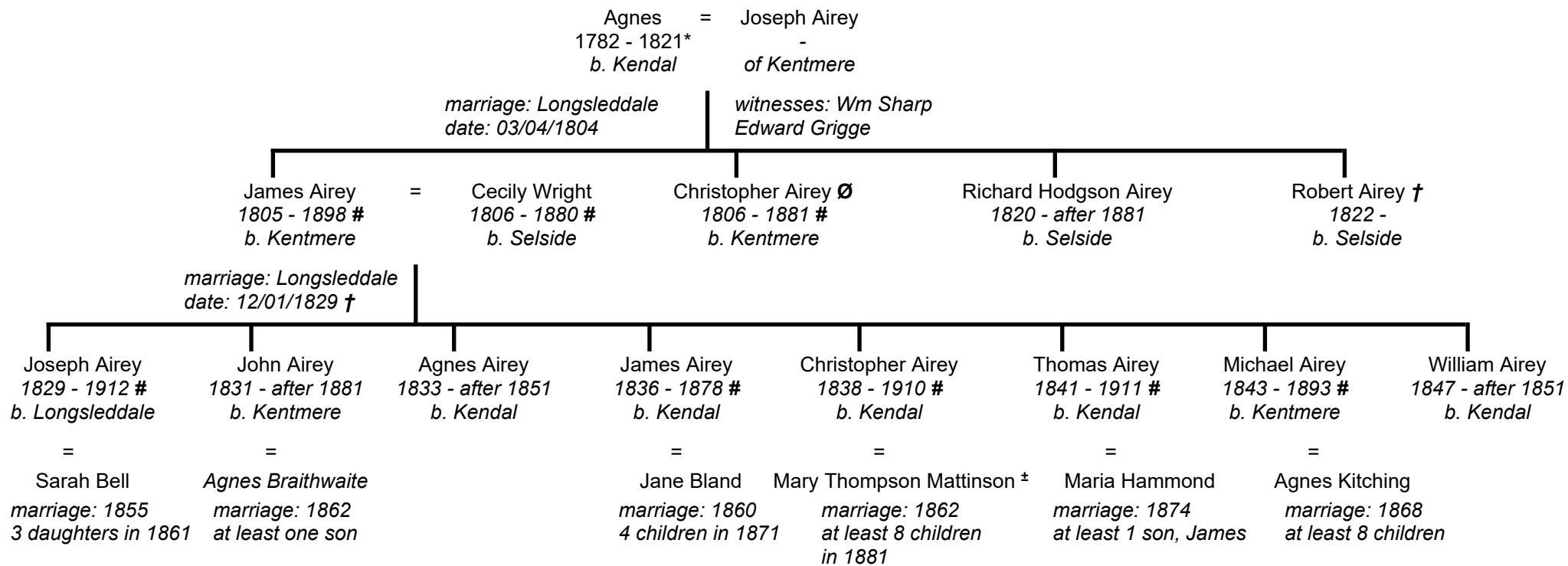

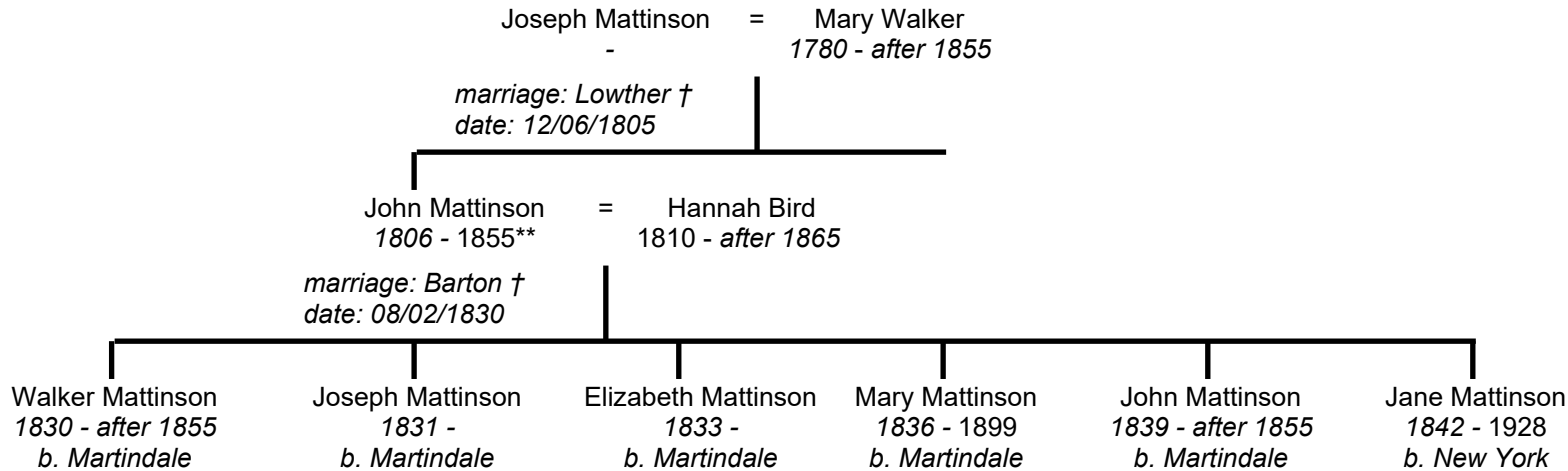

"In Barre, October 6<sup>th</sup> 1855, Mr. John Mattinson, aged 49. Mr. Mattinson was a native of Westmorland, England, and emigrated to this country [i.e. America] in the spring of 1811[sic – probably 1841], and settled on the farm where he died. He was a man possessed of many virtues, and highly esteemed in the neighbourhood where he resided. He had been for several years a Warden of the Episcopal church in Albion, and was always zealous in good works for the upbuilding of the Redeemer's kingdom. He has gone to rest – Orleans, America (New York paper)"

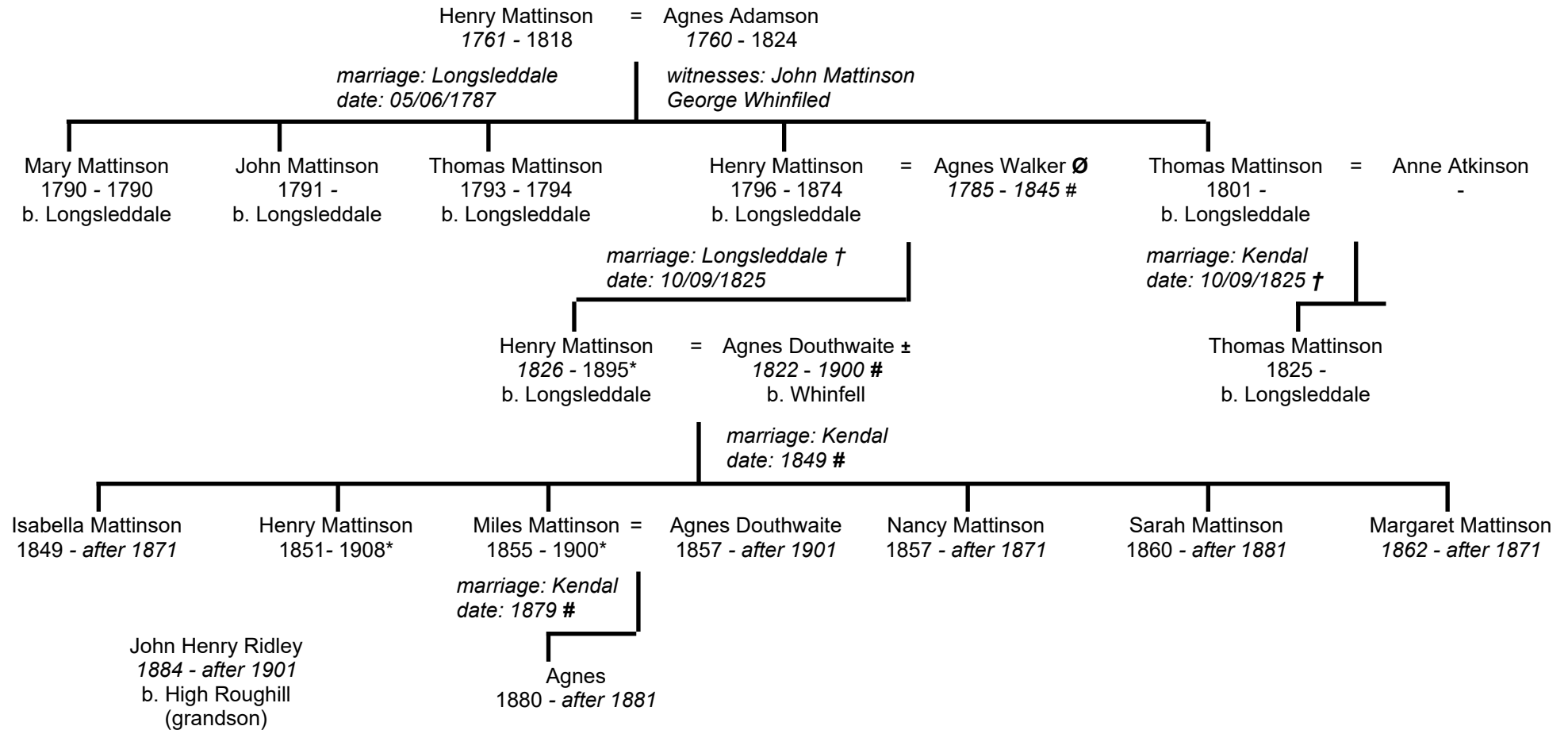

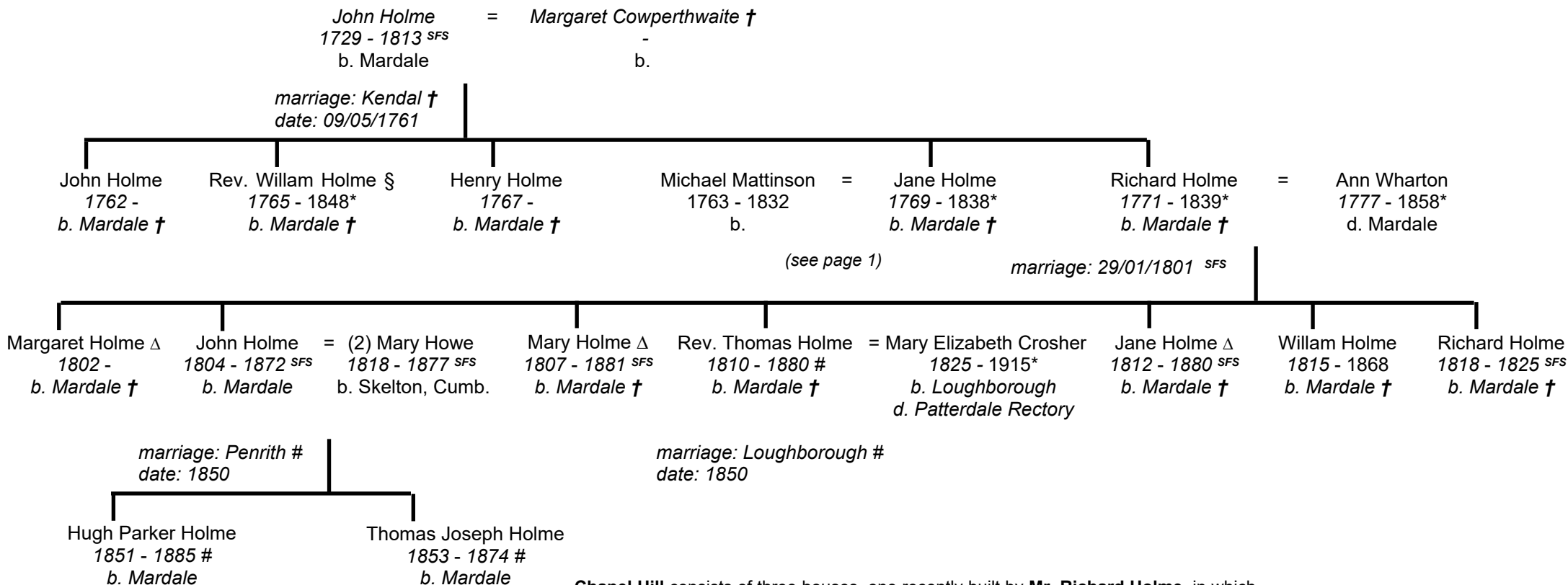

In 1841 Rev. William and Rev. Thomas were living at Rectory Place, Loughborough  
 In 1851 Rev. Thomas was Rector of Puttenham, Hertfordshire  
 In 1851 John Holme is a farmer of 600 acres in Mardale.  
 In 1851 William is unmarried and a much respected surgeon and doctor in Bowness.  
 In 1861 John Holme is a farmer of 250 acres employing three men, one of whom is William Hogarth, widower, of Kentmere [see Kentmere Hoggarths](#)  
 In 1861 William is married to Julia and has three children. He continues in General Practice. Julia is from Dacre, widowed in 1868, and dies in 1879 aged 64.  
 In 1871 John Holme is a farmer of 23 acres which he appears to own.  
 In 1881 Hugh is a landowner occupying 412 acres and employing three men.



**Chapel Hill** consists of three houses, one recently built by **Mr. Richard Holme**, in which he now resides: Mr. Holme is brother to the Rev. William Holme, of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. The late Mr. John Holme, father of the above gentleman, was a most respectable and intelligent man. Mr. Holme, with much kindness, occasionally received travellers in his house to eat and to lodge, there being no public house nearer Haws Water than Bampton, which is six miles from Chapel Hill, and two from the foot of the lake. An ancestor of the family of Holme settled anciently in these parts, and the Holmes of Mardale have lived here ever since the reign of King John.
